The Block Collects

Every year The Block brings new works of art into the collection to support Northwestern University's teaching and learning mission. Each work becomes part of an expanding resource available to students, faculty, and our wider community through classes, research visits, and exhibitions like this.

Acquired by The Block over the past five years, these works expand on the perspectives represented in the collection and build on its preexisting strengths. In Appendix 137_120 and Appendix 137_048, Walid Raad inserts patterns from abstract paintings by Lebanese artists Yvette Achkar and Huguette Caland within spaces cut out from a representational illustration; other works by Achkar and Caland are included in Taking Shape: Abstraction from the Arab World, 1950s-1980s, on view in the adjacent gallery. Works by Chicago artist Barbara Rossi and the Argentinian

Edgardo Giménez offer additional examples of mid20th-century abstraction. These prints share the
space with a selection of photographic works,
including three by Japanese-American artist and
biochemist Michael Koerner. Koerner's photographs
were selected for acquisition by Northwestern
undergraduate students in the Block Museum
Student Associates program as part of an ongoing
commitment by The Block to student-led
acquisitions.

These three works are from a project titled *My DNA* by artist and biochemist Michael Koerner and were selected to join The Block's collection by the 2021–22 Block Museum Student Associates. Koerner has said that it is the only project he will continue working on until he dies. To make these images, Koerner applied chemicals to metal plates prepared with other chemical solutions to cause reactions that create colors and

shapes. This unpredictable process parallels Koerner's lack of control over his own genetics, permanently altered by his mother's exposure to gamma radiation during the 1945 bombing of Nagasaki, Japan.

Blue DNA diptych#1205L - #1201R consists of lines of circles that look like a winding double-helix of DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid), the building block of genetic information. The Beast Diagnosis #8942 features white blots within a chaotic array of branching chemical growths reminiscent of a tumor. Worlds #0318 contains irregular silver-white geometric shapes clustered around a large disc suggestive of a planet or cell. These works consider the lasting effects of nuclear war both within an individual's body and across multiple generations.
